THE MAGICAL CITY

The Jemaa-El-Fna square is filled with orange juice sellers, henne artists, acrobats and snake charmers, which are mostly for the tourists.

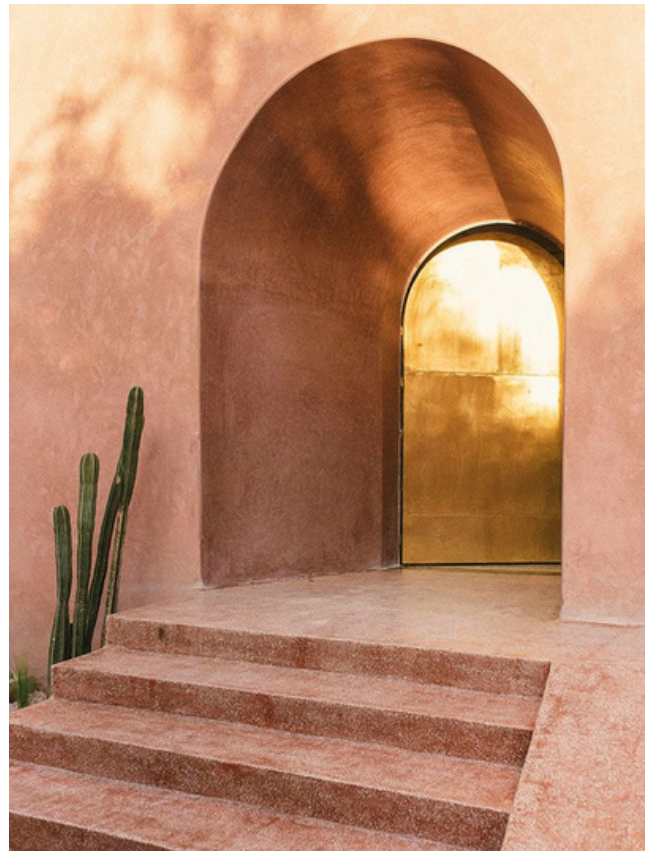
LITTLE HISTORY

Marrakech was founded in 1062. The red walls of the city, built in 1122, and various buildings constructed in red sandstone during this period, have given the city the nickname of the 'Red City'. In the year 1912 France established a protectorate over Morocco. In 1956, Morocco was officially declared independent, but the French colonial influence is still evident in Morocco. Almost all of the Moroccans speak fluently French as the language is still dominant in education and administration.

Marrakech has around 1 million inhabitants and locals are called Marrakechis. Next to them, a lot of expats packed their bags and now call Morocco their home from all over the world move to Marrakech.

THE MEDINA

Also known as the "old city" in Marrakech. This is where the magic happens. The Medina is built with narrow alleys, filled with mosques and is entirely walled. The walls of the Medina are about 20kilometers long and have 19 gates, called "bab" in Arabic. These are absolutely stunning and the perfect spots to take photos. Bab Agnaou is our favorite!



THINGS TO KNOW

Marrakech is located in the northwest of Morocco. Discovered just 1000 years ago. It sits not far from the Sahara Desert and is known by its pink/red color. Therefore, the nickname “The Red City” isn’t hard to explain. Marrakech is an exceptional city with its rich history, culture and a lot of traditions, beautiful structure and soothing gardens.

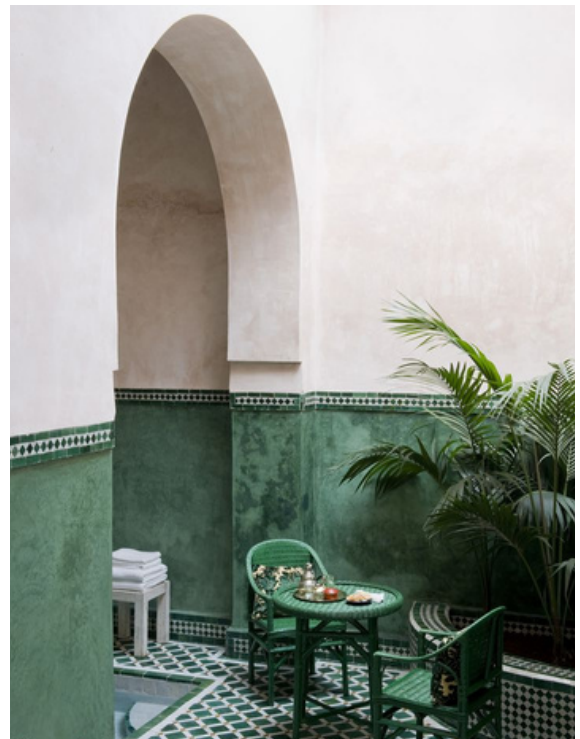
TAKING A PHOTO OF A LOCAL

Always ask before taking a photo of locals and give a few dirhams afterwards as a thank you.

HOW TO GET AROUND

Taxis are the easiest way to discover the city. But we would always recommend a private taxi or private car (generally from a touristic rental company or from the hotel).

A “taxi vert” option is always available by calling +212524409494. You can tell where you are and they will send a taxi. You always pay the price on the meter, plus an additional 15 dirhams service fee. You can recognize them through the “taxi vert” sticker on the front window and the driver is obligated to turn on the meter.



BE CAUTIOUS WITH UNSOLICITED ADVICE

This might sound a bit direct, but it’s worth keeping in mind. In Marrakech, locals are often friendly and willing to assist—for instance, offering to guide you somewhere. However, particularly in the Medina, this help often comes with an expectation of payment. To avoid these situations, rely on your phone’s map if you’re unsure of your route, or ask for directions at a shop, riad, or restaurant.

HOW TO DRESS

It’s not necessary to fully cover yourself in Marrakech. We would, however, advise against wearing hot pants and crop tops. Are you going to visit a religious place? Make sure that everything is covered, including your hair.

Time

Currency

Moroccan dirhams (MAD or DH). You should have no issue paying with credit card in hotels and some restaurants. But in the city, and especially in the Medina, we would advise to bring some Dirhams with you (that you can get easily at an ATM)

Religion

Morocco is a muslim country, so please respect the islamic religion, laws and traditions.

Language

Darija (the moroccan dialect) aka arabic. Many locals speaks fluent French and English.

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WEATHER & TEMPERATURE

From June to August temperatures are often in excess of 40 degrees and can reach the high 40's. December, January and February can see sunbathing weather in the day up to 27 degrees with nights as cool as 8 degrees. Spring and Autumn are the traditional high season times to visit Marrakech with temperatures in the high 20's to mid 30's.

IS THE TAP WATER SAFE TO DRINK?

The locals regularly drink the tap water but visiting tourists will not have time to get used to it and are probably best to drink bottled water. Mineral water can be purchased from many kiosks and stalls around the Medina and city.

VISA

Travelers From The UK, USA, And Canada Generally Do Not Require A Visa For Entry Into Morocco. Ensure Your Passport Remains Valid For At Least 6 Months From Your Departure Date From Marrakech. Upon Immigration Clearance, Tourists Typically Receive A Visa Valid For Up To 3 Months.

INTERNET & WI-FI ACCESS

SIM Cards Are Available For Purchase From Street Vendors, Maroc Telecom, Or Orange Stores. Data And Local Call Packages Are Typically Sold Separately. We Recommend Allocating Around 100MAD for Internet Access And 50 MAD for Calls. Ensure Your Phone Is Unlocked Before Purchasing A SIM Card.

Wi-fi is available in all hotels, riads, coffee shops and restaurants.

DELIVERY SERVICE

We recommend using Glovo for food deliveries and urgent small purchases.

LOCAL TABLE MANNERS

When accepting a sample of olives or dates in the souqs, or sharing a tajine with locals, always use and eat with your right hand.

If invited into a local's home, arriving with some sweet treats will be graciously received.

FAUX GUIDES

Stumbling upon a faux guide either on foot in the medina, or a man on a bike who claims to work at your hotel with offers to visit the Berber market. A firm, but polite “no thank you” (“La choukran”) is often sufficient as you walk confidently in the direction you plan to go.

If you would like to book a day tour or excursions, please ask your hotel's concierge or the event planning company.

LUNCH & DINNER

Between all the walking in the Medina, you sometimes need a break. Luckily there are some restaurants and cafés which are the perfect hotspots. We've listed our favourite ones, so you don't have to search for the perfect spot to enjoy your little break. The ones marked with a star are the ones where you can get a glass of alcohol.*

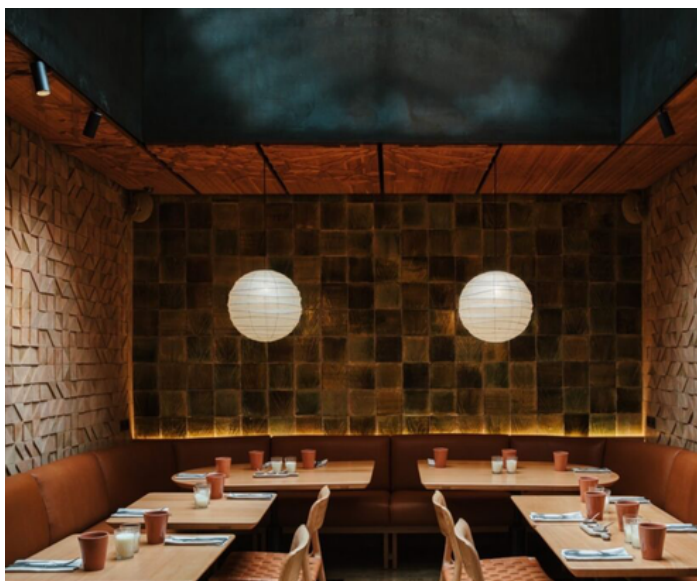

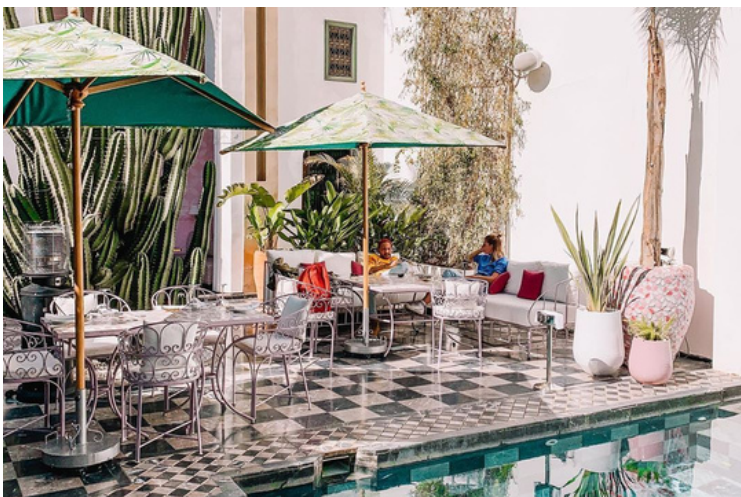

HAMMAM & SPA

Maybe you've heard of it, and maybe you're wondering what is a hammam? The Moroccan hammam is one of the most widely loved and yet puzzling experiences for people who have never visited Morocco. While public bathhouses might be associated with Turkish and Roman cultures, the traditional Moroccan hammam is a unique experience.

THE CULTURE

For most Moroccans, the Hammam is more than a spa day; it is the place of all meetings. Where men, separated from women, talk about their lives. They introduce each other's children and make friends.

It is a very different heat bath from the sauna, which is based on dry heat. It is also different from the Turkish bath, which is almost completely steamed. The Moroccan hammam heats with a coil system up to half height. Unlike the Turkish bath, it is wet but not filled with moisture.

Inspired by the Roman baths that the Arabs discovered to conquer Syria, the hammam is currently and often composed of one piece or two for the exfoliation. However, it is its shortened version that we know today. Traditionally, it includes several rooms (minimum 3) that will increase in temperature to reach the hottest room of 50 °. The goal is to evolve within these parts by accustoming the body to a gradually more intense heat. Thanks to this heat, the skin will become suppler, the pores will open.

A BEAUTY RITUAL

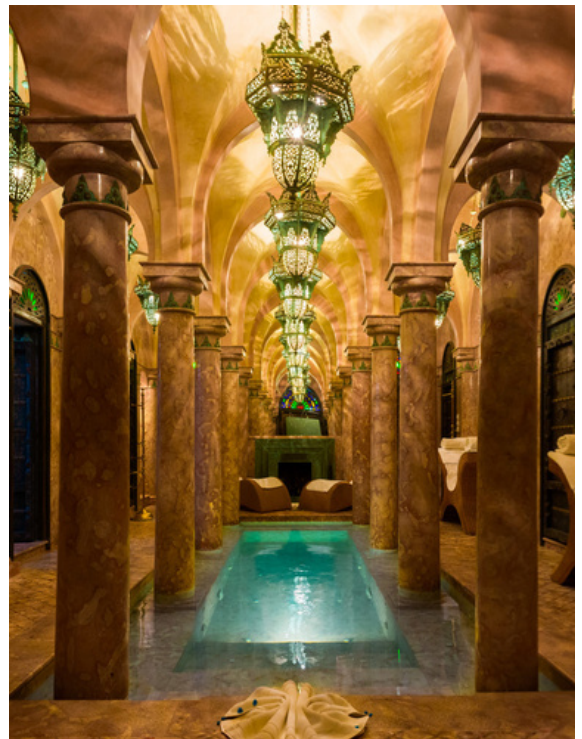
To enjoy the benefits of a hammam, stay there for a minimum of 30 minutes and a maximum of 1 hour, rest and lie on the floor or on the benches. During this time, a Kessala (name of the women practicing the scrubs in the hammams), can apply natural moroccan black soap on your whole body. Then, after a pause of about fifteen minutes where rest is required, the Kessala will rinse the black soap, using a Kessa glove, before rubbing your body to remove impurities.

Thanks to these different steps, it is a real deep exfoliation which, for novices, is sometimes incredible as the dead skin comes off and is unclogged. After a thorough rinse, the Moroccan Rhassoul clay is used on the body and hair. Excellent washing product, Rhassoul will definitely wash the body and make it soft and supple.

After these treatments, a nourishing massage nourishes the skin and the little extra that remains is the mint tea to finish this moment of incomparable tranquility.

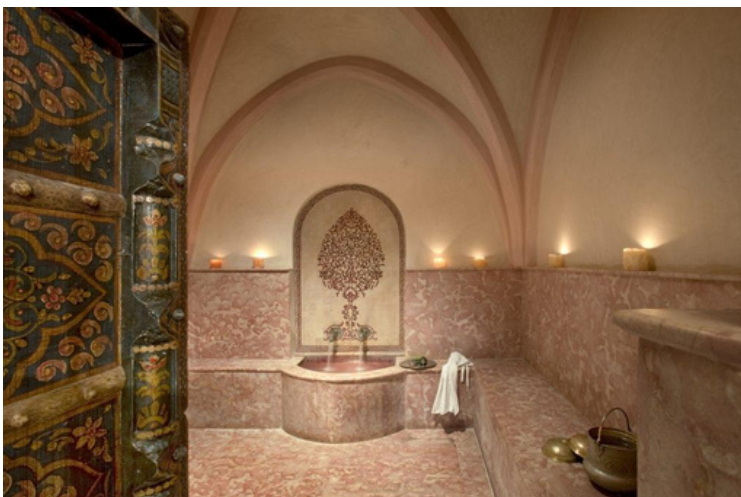

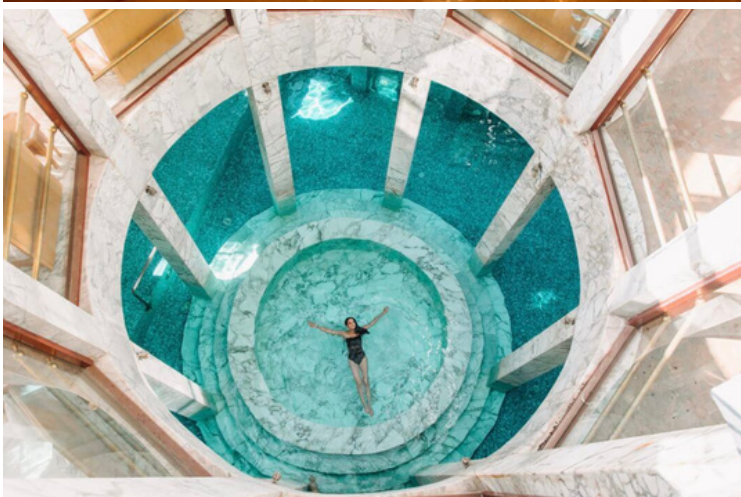

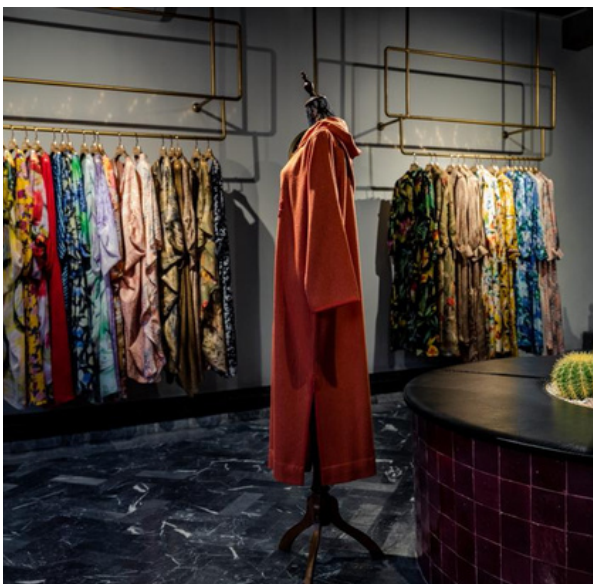

SHOPPING

When you're in the mood of shopping in Marrakech, the Souks are an absolute must-visit. The first stop can be the Main Street (which you access from Jamaa el Fna square), where you can find a selection of all goods & flavors. Around it, districts are divided by craft's categories. So you'll find the Nehassine (brass artisans), the Debbaghine (leather artisans) and so many others. Each street has a name, just look up !



The shops are different, you will jump from spices to argan oil (normally the real one isn't sold at any random shop, as locals, we get it from the Atlas Mountains or from Agadir). If you need help, please ask a shop owner.



RAHBA LEKDIMA

Or the "Spice Square" is one of the most instagramable areas in the Medina! It's ringed with with apothecaries who sell spices and mysterious spell supplies to tourists. We hate to say it but locals doesn't get their magic supplies from the Place des Epices !

The square is filled with cute Doum (straw) objects, like the cute bags and hats. You can also customize them on spot.

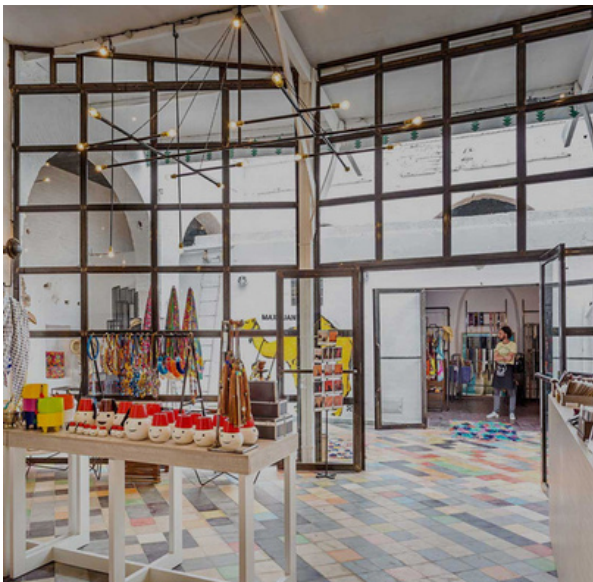

Once you've witnessed the fascinating mix of European, Middle Eastern, and African cultures, head out of the city for unparalleled mountain and desert scenery.

Wander Around the Medina

The most beautiful part of the Medina is its maze of narrow streets that transport you back in time. Throw your map in the garbage and lose yourself in the excitement while dodging donkeys and carts.

Admire the colors of the walls and buildings, the smells of the food and spices, and speak to friendly locals. Most unique of all is the sound of the call to prayer echoing among the narrow streets coming from the many mosques situated close by. To experience this high up, head to one of the many rooftop cafes to experience panoramic sounds and views.

JAMAA EL FNA SQUARE

At the heart of the Medina lies the world-famous Jamaa el Fnaa square. Walking through this square is an experience like no other! Feel the heat beating off the stone floor as you worm your way through snake charmers, entertainers, and street food stalls selling fresh juices.

By night, the square comes to life with music, with flute players, dancers, and artists all showing their talents under the twinkling lights of the stalls. This amazing demonstration of Moroccan culture is not to be missed!

TIP:

Keep few dirhams to tip performers (5 - 10 dirhams) and a bit more when you want to take a picture of locals & shops.

BEN YOUSSEF MEDRASA

Explore a world of stunning symmetry, and intricately patterned mosaics, in this former Islamic school. Located near the medina, Ben Youssef Madrassa used to be the largest Islamic college in Morocco. Founded in the 14th century, the madrasa was at one time the largest Qur'anic school in North Africa.

Following Moroccan and Andalusian architecture, the large central courtyard is breathtaking.

Spend an hour or so here, admiring the beautiful Moroccan architecture, especially the remarkable interior terrace that's centered around a tranquil pool.

Tickets are approximately 5€.



BAHIA PALACE

-This extraordinary palace, with 150 rooms, was built in the 19th century by the grand vizier of the sultan, who hoped for it to be the greatest palace of all time. Discover the traditional Moroccan architecture of the courtyards, filled with orange trees and fountains, and the beautiful stained glass windows and tilework.

Most impressive of all is the huge, luxurious marble courtyard at the center of the palace complex. Don't miss out on the opportunity to learn about the fascinating history of the grand vizier, his family, and his many wives.

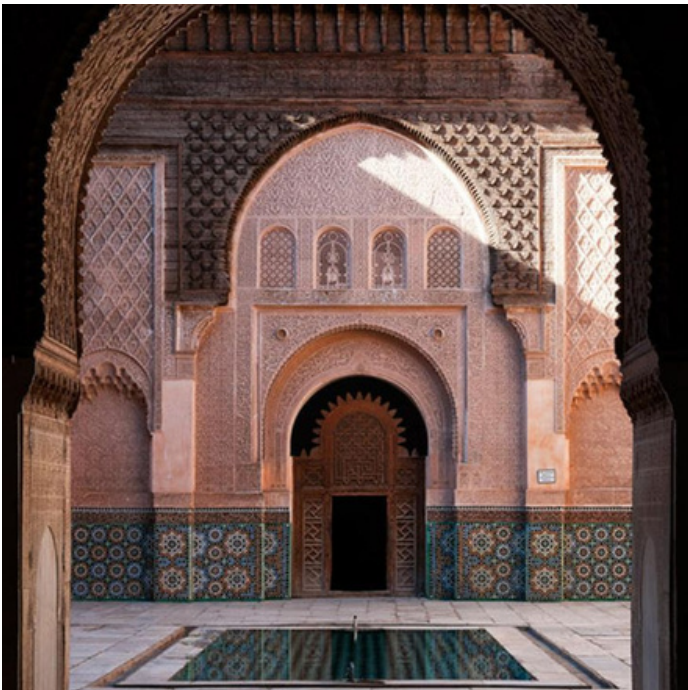
Note : nly a portion of the palace is available to see, but it's definitely worth it, especially as it's located just a 20-minute walk from Jamaa el Fnaa square. Entrance is 70 Dhs (7€), and it's open Monday to Sunday from 8 AM - 5 PM.

SIGHTSEEING

THE MELLAH

The Mellah is the old Jewish Quarter of Marrakech. It was created by Sultan Abdallah al-Ghalib of the Saadian dynasty in 1558. The purpose was to provide protection to Jews fleeing persecution in the Iberian Peninsula, as required by Sharia law at the time.

Restored several times over the years, the maze of tight laneways has less of the craziness of the medina, and more characteristics of an interesting local neighbourhood.



EL BADI PALACE

El Badii Palace is an atmospheric collection of ruins. It was constructed to celebrate the victory over the Portuguese and today takes some imagination to get the most out of it. For what it's worth, we think it's best viewed from the roof terrace at Kosybar with a beer in hand.

MAISON DE LA PHOTOGRAPHIE

Housed within this small building is the sort of street photography and portraiture that take you breath away, including some beautiful shots captured more than 150 years ago. If you have even a passing interest in art or photography, or want a snapshot into Morocco's traditions and people, this is somewhere you absolutely can't miss (it may even turn out to be one of your favourite things to do in Marrakech). Just don't forget to make some time to enjoy a mint tea in the rooftop cafe, a spot with arguably one of the best views in town!



YVES SAINT LAURENT'S HOUSE

The former home of Yves Saint Laurent is now one of the most popular tourist attractions in Marrakech featuring his house Villa Oasis, a museum to his life's work, a Berber Museum, and the beautiful Majorelle Garden.

The garden was originally designed by Jacques Majorelle, a French artist, who fell in love with the rich blue used in Berber houses and made it a feature in his own home and garden. It had such a mesmerising effect on him that shortly before his death he patented the colour which still carries his name.

Majorelle Blue continued to feature heavily after the property was purchased and restored by Yves Saint Laurent in the 1980s. It's a wonderful complex to stroll around. Even for non-fashionistas such as we, the museum to Yves Saint Laurent's design work was interesting and the video of his life compelling. The on-site restaurant is pretty good as well.

A combined entry ticket costs 300 dh per person (or separately at a cost of 150 dh for Jardin Majorelle, and 100 dh for the museum - the combo also includes Musée Pierre Bergé).
